after verifying standardized criteria



Pilot Demographics


- 39 participants (13 U.S; 26 International)





Preview Test: Case Study

Description Thomas is an active, 34-year-old man with poliomyelitis. He has been using a standard, manual wheelchair with a folding frame to be mobile around his home and to travel long distances in hilly terrain to go to work. However, Thomas admits that he is extremely tired after propelling about 18 miles per day and has no energy for leisure time with his family. When looking at Thomas, you notice the seat width is too wide and he has no cushion. You also notice that Thomas is sitting with his shoulders rounded and his trunk curved forward (flexible kyphosis) and his pelvis is not in the upright position (posterior pelvic tilt). Thomas tells you he is not very comfortable sitting in his chair and has difficulty reaching the rear wheels due to the position of the wheels. You determine that Thomas may need a more appropriate mobility device and proceed with the assessment interview.



Instructions Complete the following case study based on all WHO 8 steps in wheelchair service delivery and submit to CourseSites. Once submitted, you will be able to compare your answers with answers given by wheelchair service provision experts. While completing, use your insight based on basic training, learning modules, and personal and professional experiences. Your answers should be justified by evidence-based content, including reviewing the additional recommended resources as necessary (under the additional resources tab).

Scores

- Exam readiness tool
 - –Marginal increase on post-test
- Basic test
 - -80% completed the test prior to the pilot
 - -Of those who took test after prep course, 100% have passed
- Ethics & professionalism domain
 - **-97%**
 - -Currently have pool of 10 questions, need to determine weight in test








Feedback to date- Application Process and Communication


The information was clear and the use of graphics to explain the process helped me understanding the process

Assignments were vere useful because they provoked a lot of thinking










Feedback to date - Overall Satisfaction



Preliminary Results & Implications

- Providers want credential
 - -150 people on waiting list
- Application process is easy
- Prep course is valuable, but should be optional
- Internet was not an issue
- Potential improvement in basic test pass rate by completing full credential process
- Supported by advisory board as strategic goal







What ISWP is Suggesting by "Wheelchair Service Provider"

At initial certification, a Wheelchair Service Provider:

- Has passed ISWP Basic Knowledge Test
 - -Demonstrated knowledge in all testing domains
- Has completed wheelchair service training
 - Evidence of participation in a course that includes all basic wheelchair service principles

At re-certification, a Wheelchair Service Provider:

- Has completed 20 hours of continuing education in the area of wheelchair service provision
- Has served a minimum of 12 clients





Next Steps: Finalizing Re-Certification Process

- After 2 years, WSPs would expire and to recertify, WSP would need to complete re-certification application and present evidence of:
 - -20 hours of continuing education
 - -12 clients served







Next Steps: Finalizing Appeal Process

- A prospective applicant can appeal his/her credential or re-certification decision by providing additional evidence of training, test score, etc.
- Appeal will be reviewed by ISWP and 2 outside reviewers







Next Steps: Latin America Credential Pilot

- Planned for late summer (End of August 2017)
- Pilot in Spanish
- Recruiting participants now







Next Steps: Nominate Professional Standards Board

- Mix of academia, NGOs, and for-profit representatives across all continents and low-mid/high income
- Ensure credentialing is a transparent process
- Review code of ethics/standards of practice







Next Steps: Provide Credential to Pilot Participants & Launch

- All pilot participants who meet criteria receive credential along with guiding verbiage (code of ethics/standard of practice) and re-certification requirements
- Credential application, prep course, re-certification application, and appeal process available on website
